

## Zebra Basket Vine Aeschynanthus longicaulis

## **Description:**

This attractive plant produces attractive, lance shaped green leaves with dark maroon, stripy markings; orange-red tubular flowers appear in clusters, but only in bright light; a great plant for indoor hanging baskets; situate in bright filtered light

## **Features & Attributes**

Zebra Basket Vine has clusters of orange tubular flowers with red overtones at the ends of the stems from mid winter to late fall, which are interesting on close inspection. Its attractive glossy pointy leaves emerge light green, turning green in color with showy burgundy variegation and tinges of purple throughout the year.

This is an herbaceous evergreen houseplant with a trailing habit of growth, eventually spilling over the edges of hanging baskets and containers. This plant can be pruned at any time to keep it looking its best.

## **Planting & Growing**

When grown indoors, Zebra Basket Vine can be expected to grow to be about 12 inches tall at maturity, with a spread of 3 feet. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 10 years. This houseplant performs well in both bright or indirect sunlight and strong artificial light, and can therefore be situated in almost any well-lit room or location. It does best in average to evenly moist soil, but will not tolerate standing water. The surface of the soil shouldn't be allowed to dry out completely, and so you should expect to water this plant once and possibly even twice each week. Be aware that your particular watering schedule may vary depending on its location in the room, the pot size, plant size and other conditions; if in doubt, ask one of our experts in the store for advice. It will benefit from a regular feeding with a general-purpose fertilizer with every second or third watering. It is not particular as to soil type or pH; an average potting soil should work just fine.

There are many factors that will affect the ultimate height, spread and overall performance of a plant when grown indoors; among them, the size of the pot it's growing in, the amount of light it receives, watering frequency, the pruning regimen and repotting schedule. Use the information described here as a guideline only; individual performance can and will vary.
